NOT SEEING THE ENGLISH WOOD FOR THE SPANISH TREES

Tied up with our own products as we at Strand inevitably are sometimes one of our agents comes up with a brief description that sums up the most complex piece of equipment in a comparatively few words.

While browsing the other day through "Disco International" — a magazine which I invariably read on the train disguised in a discreet brown paper cover — because although the magazine is, of course, excellent, fellow travellers could consider it rather odd that a man of my years and distinction would read such a youth orientated publication and might therefore suspect my motives — I came across the following quotation:

T.F. Cabello the Managing Director of Kremesa Lighting -Strand's Spanish agent described the Galaxy system that his company have recently installed in the Gran Teatro del Liceo in Barcelona - 'the Galaxy, the first model to be installed in Spain, is one of the most sophisticated in the world and yet is relatively simple to operate thanks to the very flexibility it allows to the operator. It is fantastic equipment because at any given moment it allows monitoring of the lighting situation on all channels, including past and future effects. These effects can be fed in by a time programmer and this, coupled with a virtually unlimited memory and simplicity of operation make it a marvellous piece of equipment'.
